5 Steps to Writing a Good Essay Carve out time

Carve out time

- Plan: Estimate how long you will need to complete the work & make a realistic schedule!
- Start work on the project early enough to be able to resolve any issues you may run into.
 - e.g. Complete your research before the last office hour so you can attend in case you have questions about the material.
- Leave enough time to sleep on and edit your work with a clear head.

Read & understand

- Read assigned article through once without taking notes
- Read again and take notes on main points author is making
 - ▶ Identify the author's thesis & supporting arguments
 - Don't copy paste; re-write the main arguments in your own words! (understand the main point!!!)
 - If you don't understand something attend Prof. Indart's office hour (do not hesitate to ask for help)

Read & understand

- Understand the context: deepen your understanding by reading 'around' the assigned article
 - ▶ Look up references used in the article
 - ► Search for similar articles on www.project-syndicate.org or other sites
 - Search author's name online (type author's name in Google) and find other articles he/she has written or that refer to the article in question (https://scholar.google.ca/)

Form your argument- Think critically

- What do you think about what you just read?
 - Where do you agree with the author & why?
 - Where are you skeptical of the author's arguments & why?
- Try to connect what you are reading with what you have learned in this course and other economics courses
 - Is the rationale convincing? What assumptions is the author making and are they justified?
 - Do they contradict or support economic models that you have learned in the past?
 - Does the author provide solid empirical evidence for his/her claims?

Form your argument- Be clear

- Write down your thesis statement:
- This is a one (max two) sentence summary of your main argument which you will state in your introduction (generally towards the end)
 - e.g. "While I agree with the author that ..., I am less convinced by her claim that ... and will argue that..."
- Write down your main supporting arguments
 - ▶ For 1000 words, formulate at least 2 supporting arguments
 - Write a one sentence summary of each of your arguments (which you
 may include in the actual essay as e.g. paragraph openers)

Write- General

BEFORE YOU START WRITING:

- Outline, outline, outline!
 - ▶ It will help you immensely to organize your own thoughts
 - Separation of tasks: essay organization, writing (grammar, connectors, style)
 - Once you have your outline and your thesis statement, it's easy to write an introduction!
- Decide what audience you are writing for
 - For the critical review and term paper, the audience is the general reading population: who has some understanding of basic economic concepts but not detailed economic knowledge.

Write- Introduction

- Provide context for your essay in one sentence
- Context for critical analysis can be simply a reference and summary of the assigned reading
- Briefly summarize what you consider to be the main point(s) of the article(s)
- If there are many, focus on the one(s) that you will analyze in the assignment
- Give your thesis statement
- Keep it short (ideally: one paragraph)

Write- Body

- Put separate ideas into separate paragraphs
- Open new paragraphs with a summary of the argument to be presented
- Provide sources for any content that is not originally yours (see handout on How not to plagiarize)
- Cite immediately to avoid plagiarizing accidentally
- Use simple and clear language and get to the point

Write- Conclusion

Summarize your arguments:

- Give a quick summary of your main arguments
- Don't be afraid to repeat information
- Restate your thesis statement!
- Do not introduce new information: conclusion should summarize what you have shown and *how* you have shown it
- Again, keep it short and concise: one paragraph

Revise

- Leave yourself time to read through your own work and self-edit!
- Things to look out for while editing:
 - Run-on sentences and long paragraphs
 - Awkward/abrupt transitions between paragraphs
 - Repetition
 - Grammar, typos and awkward phrasing
- Run spell check
- Use the UofT Writing Centre to help you edit your work http://www.writing.utoronto.ca/writing-centres/arts-and-science or ask a friend to read over your essay

- PLAGIARISM: Representing someone else's ideas, writing or other intellectual property as your own
 - Very easy for graders to spot plagiarism: you have to submit your essays to Turnitin.com
 - ▶ Make sure to visit Beware of Plagiarism! on the course website
 - ➤ You must cite your source within the main text AND list the full source in your bibliography (e.g. in-text citation using APA format: (Krugman, 2012) or (Krugman, 2012, pp. 345-346))
- Choose a citation style, e.g. APA or MLA and stick to it (see Standard Documentation Format under Critical Review on course website)

How to format your assignment:
