## ECO 407 Competing Views in Macroeconomic Theory and Policy

## Term Paper: "Fiscal Austerity and the Great Recession"

Almost all governments of the developed world have implemented expansionary monetary policy of some sort to counteract the effects of the Great Recession. Some of these governments have complemented easy money policy with expansionary fiscal policy of different degrees (e.g., the U.S., Canada and Japan) while others have favoured a combination of less aggressive monetary expansion with fiscal austerity measures (e.g., the U.K. and the Eurozone countries).

Write a short academic paper on the rationale and wisdom of using "expansionary" austerity policies during the Great Recession. You may select a case study (e.g., a particular country or group of countries) to focus your essay. Your essay must have a clear thesis and include a brief introduction and conclusion. Your paper must be about 4000 words (+/- 5%) in length (about 15 double-space pages, without counting the bibliography) and make reference to at least eight academic works published on the topic.

A first draft of the paper will be due at the beginning of class on November 15 (late penalty: 20 percentage points of the paper's final mark without exceptions). The final draft of the paper will be due at the beginning of class on November 22 (late penalty: 5 percentage points per day without exceptions). An electronic copy of both the first and final drafts must ALSO be uploaded by their respective dates to Turnitin.com for the submission to be complete and no penalties to apply.

When submitting your paper to Turnitin.com you must refer to Class ID: **19055839** and Enrollment Password: **eco407**.

The University requires that the following paragraph be included in the syllabus of all courses using Turnitin.com:
