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ECO2060H1F: MICROECONOMIC THEORY (MA) FALL 2011

This course covers topics fundamental to theoretical and empirical economic research. The teaching approach will be geared toward applied research. The objective is to introduce you to modeling techniques that you are likely to encounter repeatedly as you further your study in economics. Importantly, the course develops the general framework adopted by economists to examine individual behavior and its impact on outcomes.
