This course examines the major contribution to economic thought of 5 authors – Aristotle, Smith, Malthus, Ricardo, and Marx – before 1870. We have two goals: understanding these major contributions and writing more effectively. Students will write relatively little to concentrate on clarity and organization. We will focus on reading and discusses pages from our authors but I will provide notes on the authors to help your understanding.

Students earn presentation marks for a one-page written review (12 point, double-spaced, normal margins) of five to ten pages from one of our authors for a potential 10 marks. The presenter will give me the review at the beginning of the seminar and give a five minute or so presentation of the material. Besides these three presentations, students, including the presenter, receive two marks for discussion during the seminar. Students sign up for their presentation days in the first class.
