I will provide a package of notes at the beginning of the term at cost (@\$10).

The final exam is a combination of short-answer and essay type questions with some choice in questions answered. The midterm is just short-answer questions with some choice.

The 15 page essay (i.e., 15 double space pages with normal margins and 12 point type, not including bibliography) analyzes primary and secondary sources specified by me on an aspect of the theories of one of the authors discussed in the course. You will submit your essay to Turnitin in our couse site at Quercus but must give me a paper copy in class. I will only accept late essays during lectures and there are no extensions. The penalty for lateness is 5% (of 100%) for June 10, and 10% on June 12. Late essays are not eligible for remarking.

"Normally, students will be required to submit their course essays to Turnitin.com for a review of textual similarity and detection of possible plagiarism. In doing so, students will allow their essays to be included as source documents in the Turnitin.com reference database, where they will be used solely for the purpose of detecting plagiarism. The terms that apply to the University's use of the Turnitin.com service are described on the Turnitin.com web site."

Presentation marks are given for a 1 page written review (12 point type, double-spaced, normal margins given to me **at the beginning of the presentation** or there is a 1 mark deduction off the top) of designated pages from an author for a potential 5 marks and 1/2 mark for the presentation (@ 5 minutes) of your review and answering questions during that seminar hour. The presentation also gives you **the right to get one half participation mark for a comment or question in each of the other seminars** up to a maximum of 5 marks for 10 seminars. Seminars take place in the first hour of our period, followed by the lecture. Students sign up for their
