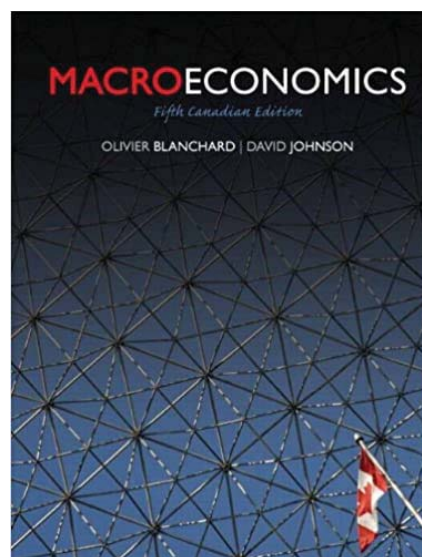

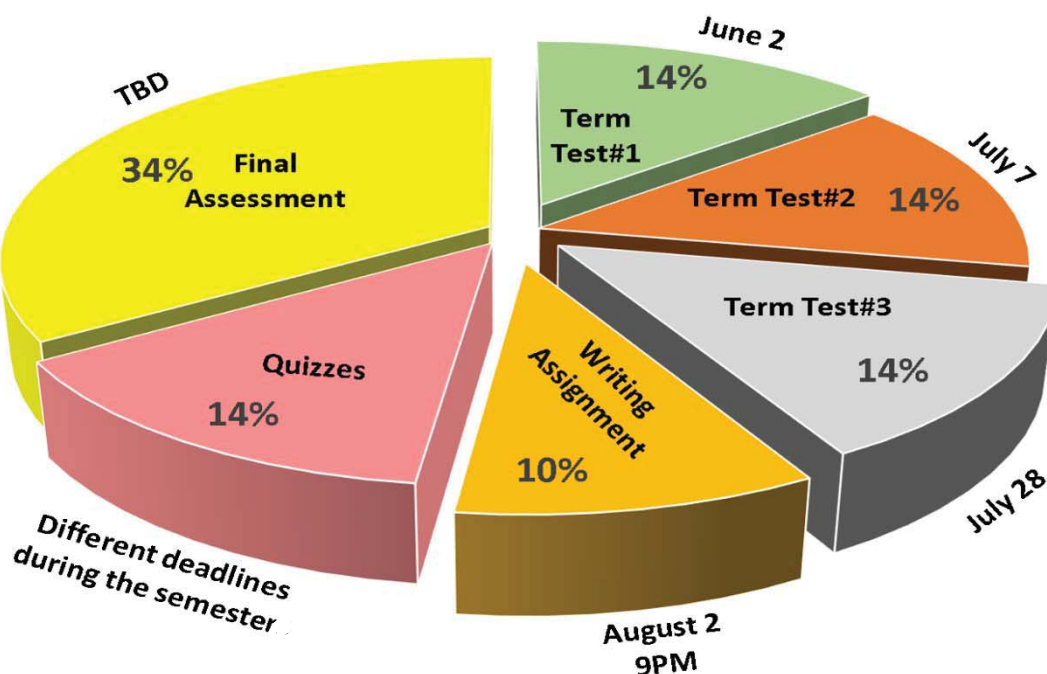

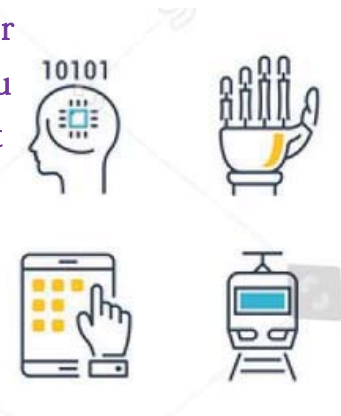


Course Delivery: This is a completely online course. The content is organized by weeks as shown in the table on the last page, in terms of the chapters and topics. There will be no meeting at a given lecture time, instead, the content will be posted during the week. Each week, you are expected to complete the readings, watch the videos, do the posted chapter exercises, and submit the online quizzes (if any for that week) by their due dates.



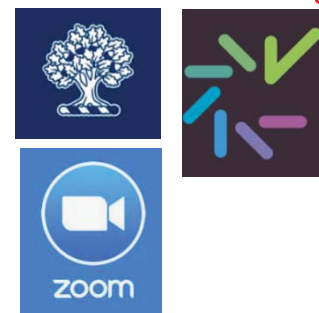
There could be changes in the order or nature of the materials, if required. The office hours are the only element of the course that will be held live online.

Technology Requirements: You must have access to a laptop or desktop computer with a strong and stable internet connection. You need a cell phone for scanning and uploading your test/assessment materials, however, the phone is not an acceptable substitute for the computer, as some required components of the course may not be accessible on smartphones. A camera and microphone are required for online contact activities such as office hours. High speed broadband access (Fiber, LAN, Cable or DSL) is required to stream the videos smoothly or submitting assessments. Also check:

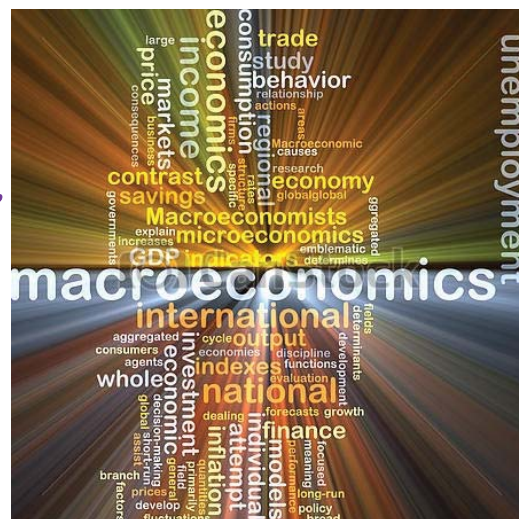

Also, different applications, programs, or platforms will be used for running, invigilating, or grading tests/assessments, also for office hours, discussion boards, and other communications. These are including, but not limited to, UofT Quercus, Crowdmark, Zoom, ... It is your responsibility to read and learn how these applications and platforms work, and what their capacities and limitations are.



Course Description: This course studies the behavior of economies in aggregate level. This is including macroeconomic behavior of economic variables in the short run, i.e. economic fluctuations, and business cycles, as well as the medium and long run adjustments and trends, and economic expansion. In each case, first, closed economies are studied, and then we extend our models and knowledge to open economies. Moreover, we will use our models to analyze the impacts of shocks, expectations, and government policies.



Prerequisites:

Prerequisites are strictly checked and enforced and must be completed before taking a course. By taking this course you acknowledge that you will be removed from the course at any time, if you do not meet all the requirements set by the Department of Economics. Term Tests: Each term test is focused on a few chapters.

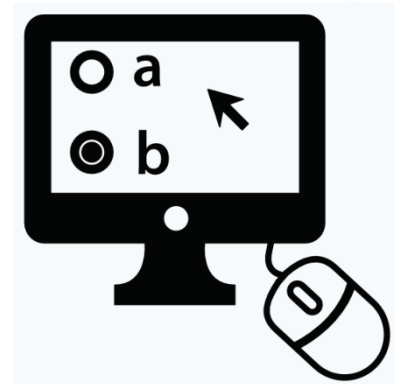
It is essential to understand that you need to strictly follow the course assessments rules, otherwise, either the assessments are not graded, or face with heavy penalties.

Writing Assignment: The topic and details of the writing assignment will be announced later. In suspicious cases, your assignment could be checked by Turnitin. The deadline for the writing assignments will not be extended, so no late deduction is applicable. No excuses like network failure or system interruption ... is acceptable. If you miss the writing assignments, they **cannot** be substituted by anything else.

Quizzes: The quizzes will be posted on the course Quercus website, each covering a few chapters, and are in multiple-choice format. When a quiz is posted with an announcement in advance, you have a few days to start the quiz. But when you start the quiz, you need to finish it in one sitting in a limited time around 2 hours. Please make sure you do not miss the quizzes, by regularly checking Quercus. If you miss them, they **cannot** be substituted by anything else.

Warning Notes:

- You have plenty of time to finish the writing assignment and quizzes, but please do not leave them to the last minutes, as many problems including technical problems or medical emergencies may arise. So, no medical or health issues or technical problems are accepted for the writing assignment and quizzes.
- As far as the term tests and final assessments concern, the due times are enforced rigorously, according to the **platform reports** about starting and ending times (not based on your or my beliefs about the times). Any work sent after the due times by emails will be ignored, and any late penalties, if applicable, will be applied according to the **platform report**.
- This course requires the use of computers and internet connections. You are responsible for ensuring that you maintain regular backup copies of your files, use antivirus software (if using your own computer), and schedule enough time when completing an assignment to allow for delays due to possible technical failures. Computer viruses, crashed hard drives, lost, or corrupted files, incompatible file formats, faulty internet, and similar mishaps are common issues when using technology, and are not acceptable grounds for missing any kind of course assessments.
- All posted times are in Eastern Time, i.e., local Toronto time. If you are in a different time zone, please make sure you correctly identify your time compare to Toronto time. Errors in calculations are not an acceptable reason to miss deadlines.



Lectures, Tutorials, and Office Hours:

Lectures and tutorials will be posted in form of prerecorded videos, in Quercus. But the office hours will be held live through the UofT-sanctioned platforms, like Zoom, Quercus, ...

The office hours may change during the semester to accommodate students in different time zones, or changes in the instructor or TAs teaching schedules. **The instructor and TAs office hours will be posted on Quercus webpage. Please check the Quercus, before stopping by.**



Notes, Emails, and Quercus Course Website:

Quercus: All the course materials like exercises, quizzes, notes, prerecorded videos, announcements, ... will be posted on the Quercus course website. It is your responsibility to follow up and get the information about the tests, quizzes, and other issues.

Notes: For your convenience, I will also post course notes on the website. The notes are the written version of the presentations that I go over in videos, but to encourage you to watch the videos, the notes are **NOT** complete. You can complete the notes by watching the videos. The completed versions of the notes are **NOT** available.

Emails: You need to send your emails only from your UofT account to instructor' s UofT email account: masoud.anjomshoa@utoronto.ca. I prefer **NOT** to use Quercus email.

RE-grading Appeals:

In order to appeal for re-grading your assessments, you should submit the Re-grading Request Form (ask me for it), by email, within **2 weeks (or shorter because of other constraints)** after returning the grades. After this period, no request is accepted. I may re-grade the entire assessment, so your grade can go either way, up or down, or remain unchanged.



Other Issues:

- In this course, the textbook is followed closely, but supplementary examples, graphs, articles, videos, and materials might be discussed or posted. Students are responsible for all the course materials for the tests and assessments.
- There might be some marginal grade adjustments for the final grade of the course at the instructor's discretion, in terms of letter grade. In case of petition for re-grading of the final assessment, the adjustment may be revised for the final mark of the course.
- This course is scheduled based on regular 6-hours-a-week in-class lectures. However, the video lectures could be lengthier to explain the materials deeper, using more details, examples, calculations, and graphs. Of course, you can watch the videos at a faster speed.
