#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

The course examines modern macroeconomic theory and provides the students with a toolkit for analyzing important Canadian macroeconomic issues such as economic growth, unemployment and inflation. Students will learn about the theory of exchange rate determination, capital markets, and international macroeconomic policy. Special attention will be paid to the importance of monetary policy and the channels through which it affects the economy. Students will also study how government budget deficits affect interest rates, trade balances, and exchange rates.

#### **REQUIRED TEXTBOOK**

A.B. Abel, B. S. Bernanke, and R.D. Kneebone (ABK), *Macroeconomics, Fifth Canadian Edition (Pearson Addison Wesley, 2008*).

Regular use of the text's Companion Website (<a href="www.pearsoned.ca/abel">www.pearsoned.ca/abel</a>) and the purchase of the text's accompanying **study guide** are recommended.

#### READING ASSIGNMENTS

Reading assignments consist of Chapters 1 to 15 of the required text (ABK) as well as handouts and supplementary materials from time to time. The chapters from the required text will be covered sequentially during lecture hours. Any changes in coverage and deletions, if applicable, will be pre-announced in class and/or posted on the course website. Handouts and supplementary reading assignments will also be posted on the course website during the year. Here a rough time line for the course:

## **TESTS / EXAMS**

If for emergency reasons, consistent with the university rules, you miss a term test, its weight will be shifted to the remaining test(s). The weight for the last test, if missed for emergency reasons, will be shifted to the final exam. In these instances, students are required (without exceptions) to submit official documentation in person (i.e., not by fax or by e-mail) within one week of the missed test. Late submissions will not be accepted. Students who fail to provide a compelling reason for missing a term test will receive a grade of zero for the missed test.

A maximum of two term tests may be missed for emergency reasons subject to conditions outlined above. <u>Failure</u> to write term tests for a third or fourth time will result in a mark of zero for the missing tests under any circumstances.
