Economics 435/1730 is a half-year course that examines the economic development of China. Although much of our attention will be directed towards an assessment of the post-1978 economic reforms in China, we will take a longer perspective on the growth process and consider the Chinese economic system between 1949 and 1978.

I plan to run this class like a seminar, with active participation on your part. Each week there will be a set of readings and questions that will serve as the basis for the following weeks' lecture/seminar. The readings will be extensive and will require a significant input on your part. On average, anticipate roughly ~100-150 pages of reading a week. You will be able to download the readings from the course website. An asterisk (\*) identifies the most important readings. The success of the class depends on your preparation.

There is no required text, but there are two books that will serve as good background if this course is your first one on the Chinese economy.

Reflecting my desire to run this course like a seminar, your weekly participation in class will serve as part of the basis for evaluation. Each week, I will also ask individual students to make short presentations on a new paper related to that week's topic, which will form part of your participation mark (15% in total). In addition, there will be one paper, worth 25% of your final grade. I have several suggestions for topics, and we can discuss more in class. Finally, there will be mid-term (25%) and a comprehensive final (35%). The midterm is scheduled for October 21 and will be 75 minutes. Based on experience, to do well on the exam, you must be familiar with the readings assigned over the course of the semester.
