A hard draft of the term essay may be handed in two weeks in advance of the due date (on March 14) for feedback on the writing and quality of the economic argument. Drafts, annotated with feedback, will be returned in class the following week. Late essays (essays submitted after midnight on March 28) will be penalized at a rate of 4% per day, including weekends. Final essays must be submitted through Turnitin (see below). Late essays can be submitted electronically at any time.

There is no requirement to write both term tests as only the higher mark will count toward the final grade. However, there is no option to re-write missed tests. If a student misses both tests, he/she will

receive a 0/30 with no exceptions. Students are strongly encouraged to attempt the first term test on February 1.
