QUESTIONS:

- 1. What is 'Imperialism'? Is it the same as or something more than just 'colonialism'? How did 19th-century colonialism, empire-building, imperialism differ from those of earlier time: in particular from the colonialism of early-modern Mercantilism (16th to 18th centuries)?
- 2. What does the historical concept of 'The Imperialism of Free Trade' mean or involve? Were Free Trade and Imperialism or 19th-century colonialism economically and philosophically compatible?
- 3. Explain the origins and development of the Free Trade movement in Great Britain to 1846; and the spread of Free Trade to continental Europe up to the 1870s. What influence did such Free Trade policies have upon the conduct of international trade, especially with the Americas, Africa, and Asia? How did they influence the conduct of trade between the European powers and their colonial acquisitions, formal or informal?
- 4. How and Why did the Classical School of Economics and the Free Trade Movement have a moralist view of economics: especially in the belief that Free Trade would mean economic interdependence and the end of warfare?
- 5. How did the nature of European Imperialism change after the 1870s: the era of 'New Imperialism' or, as it sometimes called, chiefly by Marxists, 'The Era of Capitalist Imperialism'?
- 6. How was the European development of racism and racist philosophies related to 19th-century European Imperialism?
